Monday, we went to schools to talk about the college/Met competency program. Applications are due on Friday, the 24th.

We had the last class of the year for College Unbound and evaluations. Educationally, it was an amazing year. Politically, it was a horrible year. Sixteen adult learners will be graduating Friday night at our gym, some in one year, others in two. Then Saturday, they will go through the official graduation at Roger Williams University.

On Tuesday evening, I zoomed off to DC to help an online college/company Laurette (Walden College in the US and 50 colleges in Brazil) around new competency-based curriculum. Of course, our presentation started with the student, about real work, etc.

It was a long day, and I flew home late to an early Met board meeting. We have three new members: a just relieved CCRI VP, the chief of staff to the new president at URI (and parent to a kid in East Bay), and the director of Alex and Ani's International Business. All fun!

Friday: CU graduation- yeah! Then off to Indianapolis to meet with Ali Jafari, who designed a new networking program (Course Networking) that we have been using in College Unbound. It has a simple fallback way of working, and allowed our students to post and respond to each other about our assignments. We will also be making a presentation about our work.

This week we had a strategic launch of the newest animation we produced for Leaving To Learn. We did not know what to expect but after 72 hours we had 13,000 hits on You Tube. It will be interesting to see if it will go anywhere near viral and what it will mean for our work. Next week Charlie and I will be in Washington, DC doing a webinar on Leaving To Learn. At this time, we will also show the animation. Thus far, it has been a blast to hear responses to the book. Everywhere I go someone is telling me they read it and are using it in a variety of ways that range from citing it in their dissertation to using it in their classrooms with their students. We have had little if any negative comments. As other authors have told us, the only thing to do is to keep on promoting the book. It all takes time.

The last two days I have been with Andrew at Harvard where we met with his Education Leadership cohort and their mentors. I met lots of great people and got caught up on what some of the best organizations and districts in the country are doing. The best things about programs like the Ed Leader Program that Andrew is in is not what is done for classwork or research projects. The best things happening are in the informal learning settings where people work, share, practice, and develop new ideas and relationships. Unfortunately, there is little research being done on the value of informal learning.

Before going to Harvard, I spent a day at MUSE. This year things have come a long way. Their staff has gelled. Their programs like G-STEAM and PCM are developing and they are on the right pathways to becoming a school with unique programs and something to really offer students and the rest of the world.

Internship


The internship is central to the success of Addison's Big Picture experience. Like many young people, Addison was unsure of his future and uninspired by school. The advisory teachers at Launceston City Campus helped Addison find his passion so that he could connect with learning.

He was interested in art and tattooing. It was a start. Then they helped him find a mentor and a place to learn deeply. The art gallery at the university wanted to reach out to the community just as Addison wanted to reach in. The power of a good internship began. His mentor, like many adults in the community, was only too pleased to help.

University Entry

The internship was exhilarating and successful and Addison wanted to go further. But how? He had found his passion and needed some more learning. The traditional path is to do well in final exams and go to university. He tells us that doing exams is not his strength. The Launceston City Campus advisors helped him find another way. They helped him assemble evidence of his learning in a powerful portfolio. The university could see the learning and the commitment and granted Addison entry.

Now, Addison is following his passion. He is at university.

South Side success story

PROVIDENCE — Juan Cameron was 17 when his father asked him where he thought he'd be in 10 years. Cameron said he'd be dead. He was growing up in the Lockwood neighborhood in Upper South Providence and already living the street life. At 17, he sold drugs and was sent to the Training School. At 19, he was injured in a drive-by shooting. At 20, just a month before graduating from the Met School, he was arrested for possessing crack cocaine and marijuana

While he sat in a holding cell after that arrest, Cameron realized where his life was heading. "I was scared that my future was going to be this, and nothing more," the 27-year-old man says now.

The Met empowers its students to take charge of their learning, become responsible citizens and lifelong learners. Met milestones include internships, individual learning plans, advisories and a breakthrough college transition program.

ADVISOR: Brief Description

Advisor duties:

- Facilitate quarterly learning plan meetings with each student and their family
- Implement, by instruction and action, the BPL philosophy of education
- Forecast the educational needs of each student based on their interests and abilities
- Identify learning opportunities and internships for students
- Facilitate internship searches through phone calls, shadow days and informational interviews to ensure that each student has an internship
- Monitor student internships through site-visits (bi-weekly), phone calls (weekly) and mentor meetings (monthly)
- Report on each student's educational and social progress in detail through quarterly narratives, phone calls to parents and weekly student meetings
- Run at least two sessions with advisory per day on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays
- Attend weekly staff meetings, monthly retreats and yearly training sessions
- Facilitate additional educational and health services for each advisee as needed
- Mediate student conflict
- Maintain complete and factual records (transcripts) on each student as required by school and law
- Work with staff on strategies for grade levels, school and network
- Make provisions to be available to students and parents for education-related reasons outside of the school day when necessary
