Professor Verity Firth AM As Vice President, Societal Impact, Equity and Engagement, UNSW, Verity is a strong advocate for student equity and public education and leads the Societal Impact framework development for UNSW, the Universities strategy development, and plays a leading role in influencing and shaping Australia's Higher Education policy agenda.
Dean Ashenden Dean has been a consultant/adviser to education agencies in all states/territories and at the national level. As an education historian and writer, he has contributed to mainstream print outlets and to social/political affairs, academic, and professional journals. His most recent book is <i>Unbeaching the Whale: Can Australia's schooling be</i> <i>reformed?</i> He was a co-founder, co-compiler and co-publisher of the <i>Good Universities Guides</i> , a co-author of the seminal <i>Making the</i> <i>Difference: Schools, Families and Social Division</i> , and author of the 2022 Australian Political Book of the Year <i>Telling Tennant's Story: The</i> <i>strange career of the great Australian silence</i> . He is a Senior Honorary Fellow at the University of Melbourne.
Chris Bonnor AM Chris is a school education researcher and writer, co-author (with Tom Greenwell) of <i>Choice and Fairness: A Common Framework for All</i> <i>Australian Schools</i> and of <i>Waiting for Gonski: How Australia Failed Its</i> <i>Schools</i> . Chris is a former secondary school principal and was a previous head of the NSW Secondary Principals' Council. He has contributed to a range of publications and media, and has jointly authored papers on Australia's schools in association with the Centre for Policy Development and the Gonski Institute for Education.
Viv White AM Viv White AM is co-founder and CEO of Big Picture Learning Australia (BPLA), a non-profit company established in Australia in 2006, whose innovative and internationally recognised design for personalised, learning is being implemented in over 50 secondary schools around Australia. Viv has also pioneered a new non-ATAR credential known as the <i>International Big Picture Learning Credential (IBPLC)</i> that is warranted by the University of Melbourne, and accepted by 17 universities around Australia.
